
Our Mission is to Provide Academic Excellence for All Students



Closing the College Equity Gap

We fund the College Access Program (CAP) and an additional college counselor in an effort to give every student, regardless of their background, the support they need to apply to college. These supports help to close the equity gap, reduce college application stress, motivate students to work harder and inspire some to dream bigger! Over time we hope even more students will gain entrance to the college of their choice and attend 4-year colleges upon graduation.

The Mental Health Center

In response to the nationwide teen mental health epidemic, we fund 50% of the Center's costs which enabled them to host 1900 student visits last year.

Additional Guidance Counselor

The additional Guidance Counselor improves the student to counselor ratio by 20%. This allows students greater access to a holistic support system that bolsters their success.

Smaller Classes

Smaller classes improve teacher retention and students benefit from greater opportunity for class discussion, individual feedback, and deeper connection.



Expanded Elective Offering

Additional elective periods enable students to receive their first choice 95% of the time and are critical to a quality high school experience. They also help foster passions in subjects that provide pathways to careers and post–secondary interests.


